A word from our Board Chair and Chief Executive.

This has been a year of amazing milestones for Cancer Council SA and our community, as we worked together to reduce the rate and impact of cancer for all South Australians.

- In November we welcomed guests to our brand-new, integrated cancer building at 202 Greenhill Road,
 Greenhill Lodge, providing state of the art accommodation alongside our full range of services and supports, all under one roof, to ensure that all South Australians impacted by cancer have every chance to survive their diagnosis.
- We swam around the Brighton Jetty dressed head to toe as '50s icon Marilyn Monroe, in the 10-year anniversary of the Marilyn Jetty Swim in February, with this iconic community reaching their goal of \$1 million raised over the past decade.
- In May we celebrated 30 years of Australia's Biggest
 Morning Tea, with over 1,800 hosts getting their friends,
 family and workmates together over a cuppa while raising
 over \$1.2 million for South Australians impacted by cancer.

In the lead up to another huge milestone for Cancer Council SA, our 100-year anniversary in 2028, we were proud to launch Cancer Council SA's five-year strategy this year. At the centre of our Strategic Plan is our purpose: to reduce the rate and impact of cancer through best practice prevention, research and support.

It was fantastic to see State and Federal Governments release their new Tobacco Control Strategies this year, thanks to Cancer Council SA's ongoing advocacy to reduce smoking rates and more recently, to reduce the rate of vaping in our community, especially among young people. These new laws complement our new Tackling Tobacco Program, which works with community service organisations to support at-risk clients to quit smoking and vaping.

We continued to foster valuable partnerships to enable greater reach and better outcomes for the South Australian community. It was a pleasure to partner with Wellbeing SA on our 'Same Goes For You' sun protection campaign and bowel cancer screening campaign to reduce the rate of cancer in our community.

Our research team conducted an important study looking at the impact of junk food advertising on children which will help to inform our future advocacy in this space. We also continue to work with our research partners to fund the state's best and brightest cancer researchers through the Cancer Council Beat Cancer Project.

Everything we have achieved over the past year is only possible thanks to the generous support of the South Australian community, corporate partners, and our amazing staff and volunteers. Thank you so much for your incredible support that makes our work possible. We simply could not do what we do without you.

What your support made possible this year.

With the support of the South Australian community, we have achieved some incredible things over the past year. Here is a snapshot of what you made possible:

AUGUST

Cancer Council SA raised **\$180,000** this Daffodil Day to fund vital cancer research projects right here in South Australia.

OCTOBER

Cancer Council SA launched the 'Same Goes For You' sun protection campaign in partnership with Wellbeing SA. The campaign, which targeted South Australian men aged 40-60 years, highlights that when you



cover things up, they last longer. Same goes for your skin!

NOVEMBER

We moved into our new building, Greenhill Lodge, and officially welcomed our first Lodge guests to our brand new, state-of-the-art accommodation.

ANUARY

The Cancer Council Beat Cancer Project invested **\$2 million** into local, South Australian cancer research across a range of different cancer types including breast, bowel, prostate, gynaecological and leukaemia.

FEBRUARY

The 10th anniversary of the Marilyn Jetty Swim saw a record number of Marilyns (and Man-ilyns) paddle around Brighton Jetty. Incredibly, it reached its target of raising **\$1 million** over the past decade.

FEBRUARY

Minister for Health and Wellbeing the Hon. Chris Picton MP officially opened our new integrated cancer building. It was a beautiful celebration with other Members of Parliament, Lodge guests, major donors, corporate partners, our volunteers, Board members and staff.

MARCH

Over 300 participants 'Marched to a Million' in the Gawler Relay For Life, reaching over **\$1 million** raised since the event began in 2009.



MAY

More than 1,800 South Aussie hosts helped us celebrate 30 years of Australia's Biggest Morning Tea. We broke our record for fundraising in South Australia, raising over \$1.21

1AY

The Cancer Council Beat Cancer Project was able to invest a further **\$500,000** into two local South Australian cancer research projects to support the transition of their research findings from the lab into the clinic. This brings the Cancer Council Beat Cancer Project's total investment in South Australian cancer research to **\$2.5 million** this year.

Our work is only possible thanks to the generous support of the South Australian community.


Together, we are working to reduce the rate and impact of cancer for all South Australians through life-saving prevention programs, research and support services.

This year, we saw our strongest return on fundraising investment in five years, reflecting strong income from gifts in Wills, growth in corporate partnerships and fantastic results in our community fundraising since the impact of COVID-19. This result has enabled us to invest even more in research, meet the costs associated with operating our new integrated cancer building and plan investment in future services for people impacted by cancer.

We also saw a decline in grant funding, with the completion of our Quitskills Program which was generously funded by the Australian Government from 2012-2022. In 2023, Cancer Council SA introduced our Tackling Tobacco pilot program with support from Drug and Alcohol Services South Australia which continues to support people who are homeless, live with mental illness, are unemployed, or facing financial challenges to quit smoking.

We are incredibly grateful to have received \$10 million over the past three years from the South Australian Government towards the construction of our new integrated cancer building which concluded in November 2022, with the majority of construction taking place during the 2021-22 financial year.


Where the money comes from*








How we put the money to work*

Empowering South Australians to take steps to reduce their cancer risk.

In Australia around one third of all cancers diagnosed are preventable. This equates to around 44,000 cancer cases each year.

Cancer Council SA aims to reduce the rate of preventable cancers through our evidence-based prevention programs, and early-detection awareness and education.

Protecting children from harmful UV radiation

This year, Cancer Council SA's SunSmart Schools and Early Childhood Program protected 131,000 South Australian children and their educators from harmful UV radiation.

In March, Cancer Council SA visited Surrey Downs Primary School – a proud SunSmart school for over 17 years – with Minister for Education, Training and Skills the Hon. Blair Boyer MP to celebrate the success of the program and new research that shows that melanoma rates are decreasing in people under 40. We were pleased to see all South Australian television news outlets cover the release of this exciting new research to help raise awareness of the impact sun protection can have on reducing future skin cancer risk.

Tackling Tobacco

This year, Cancer Council SA's Tackling Tobacco Pilot Program continued in South Australia.

Smoking is still the single largest cause of preventable death and disease in our community. While we have seen a downward trend in overall smoking rates, with 8.2 per cent of South Australian adults smoking daily, smoking rates are significantly higher among vulnerable people.

We know that people who are homeless, live with mental illness, are unemployed, or facing financial challenges are more likely to smoke. With funding from Drug and Alcohol Services South Australia, we are working with community organisations who work with people in these circumstances to help their clients guit smoking and vaping.

Smoking and e-cigarette advocacy success

Cancer Council SA has a proud history of working with the community to reduce smoking rates over the past 40 years. Over the past year, one of our major advocacy priorities has been vaping due to the significant risk it presents to young people and our community.

Cancer Council SA's sustained advocacy in our state, along with support from our Federation of Cancer Council organisations across Australia, has resulted in significant progress in this area—with proposed new laws announced this year aimed at stopping the importation of illegal vapes into the country and strengthening the ban on illegal retail sales of vapes.



"Our hope is that these law changes not only strengthen the regulations around smoking and vaping in South Australia, but also raise awareness in the community on the effects vaping can have on health."

Cancer screening education and awareness in the Limestone Coast

Cancer screening participation rates in the Limestone Coast are below the South Australian average and research suggests that screening rates among individuals from Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) backgrounds are even lower.

With funding from the Commonwealth Government's Country SA Primary Health Network, Cancer Council SA conducted focus groups with CALD communities in the Limestone Coast to learn about barriers to screening. Our Prevention team travelled to the Limestone Coast to run cancer prevention and screening information sessions for approximately 110 members of the CALD community.

We have received excellent feedback from the community about the impact of these workshops on awareness of screening in the Limestone Coast CALD community. When asked to describe any changes in the community since the workshops, one regional provider said they had noticed more members of the CALD community making a visit to their GP to discuss screening and another said that they had seen great CALD community representation when BreastScreen SA's mobile screening unit visited the area.



Researching new ways to reduce the rate and impact of cancer.

Funding the best and brightest cancer researchers

Since 2011, Cancer Council SA and SA Health have invested more than \$40 million into funding South Australia's best and brightest researchers working to reduce the rate and impact of cancer through the Cancer Council Beat Cancer Project.

The Cancer Council Beat Cancer Project is a collaboration between Cancer Council SA, the State Government, South Australian Health and Medical Research Institute (SAHMRI) and the three major South Australian universities.

In the past year, Cancer Council SA and SA Health invested \$2.5 million dollars into South Australian cancer research projects across a range of cancer types through the Cancer Council Beat Cancer Project.



"Cancer Council's Beat Cancer Project will help us test a new form of hormone-based therapy that may prevent breast cancer cells from leaving the breast to seed and grow in vital organs like the brain and liver.

Funding from Cancer Council's Beat Cancer Project is critically important to keeping the South Australian cancer research sector alive and productive."

Investigating how much junk food advertising our children are seeing

Cancer Council SA's research team conducted a study looking at the amount of junk food advertising near South Australian schools this year. We know that regular consumption of junk food can be associated with long-term weight gain, which can increase a person's risk of cancer. That's why we are concerned about the impact of this advertising on children and parents. The study looked at advertising on government-owned public transport assets, such as buses and bus shelters, within 500 metres of 65 South Australian public schools.

The results of the study revealed that almost 80 per cent of food and drink advertisements South Australian children will see on their way to school are about junk food.

Currently in South Australia, bus stops and buses have no restrictions on the types of food and drink advertising that can be shown on them. This research supports Cancer Council SA's advocacy for restrictions on junk food advertisements on government owned assets to help parents in encouraging their children to make healthier choices.

Peter Nelson Leukaemia Research Fellowship

Cancer Council SA is proud to administer the Peter Nelson Leukaemia Research Fellowship Fund on behalf of the Hon. Marjorie Jackson-Nelson, former Governor of South Australia and Olympic athlete. To date, the fund has invested more than \$5 million into South Australian leukaemia research.

Over the past 45 years, the Peter Nelson Leukaemia Research Fellowship Fund has supported nine talented researchers working towards a cure for leukaemia.

Dr Laura Eadie from SAHMRI is a former recipient of the Peter Nelson Leukaemia Research Fellowship, and in her first year discovered that a drug showed great potential to treat T-cell acute lymphoblastic leukaemia (T-ALL)—a type of leukaemia that is most commonly found in children aged 14 and younger.

Since then, Dr Eadie has continued to focus on how and when this drug can be used, with recent studies showing it is not only effective, but is far safer and has less side effects, which will have a huge impact on those currently going through treatment.

Researchers like Dr Eadie are the key to unlocking a future free from leukaemia and continuing to increase survival rates for generations to come. That's why it's so important that we keep momentum going by funding more leukaemia researchers as they work towards the next cancer breakthrough.

More than 11,000 South Australians are diagnosed with cancer every year. Our aim is to be here for every South Australian impacted by cancer with best practice support and information.

Giving cancer survivors tools to live well after treatment

Getting back to a healthy lifestyle after cancer is one of the most important things you can do for your health. In the past year, Cancer Council SA has run three Healthy Living after Cancer Programs.

Our 12-week Healthy Living after Cancer Program gives people the tools to live well after cancer treatment. Through a combination of evidence-based workshops and weekly coaching calls, participants are encouraged to make healthy lifestyle changes focusing on physical activity, healthy eating and emotional wellbeing.



"Once your hair grows back everyone around you thinks that you're OK, but I think that is the time you start to process what has just happened to you. Cancer Council SA's Healthy Living after Cancer Program helped me feel grounded

Ensuring cancer information and support is just a phone call away

Having information you can trust is essential to help people better understand their situation and support them, their carers, family members and loved ones in their decision making and plans for their future.

In the past year, our Cancer Council 13 11 20 Nurses made more than 5,000 connections with South Australians seeking cancer information and support.

Over 30 per cent of people who called 13 11 20 connected with our cancer nurses for emotional support; 27 per cent for practical issues like financial assistance, legal and financial planning; 25 per cent for general information; and 11 per cent for help in relation to treatment and management of side effects.

Our nurses understand the impact of cancer and its treatment, and how it can affect many aspects of a person's life. No matter what type of cancer, where someone lives, their age or experience, our nurses were there to help.



"When I was diagnosed with cancer, I contacted a 13 11 20 nurse and straight away they had organised six counselling sessions and ongoing therapy after that. They even provided financial assistance and checked in on me – they were amazing."

Making cancer information available to regional South Australians

For people living in regional areas, a cancer diagnosis can present a unique set of challenges. Cancer Council SA is committed to ensuring that regional South Australians have access to up-to-date, evidence-based, trustworthy cancer information covering risk factors, early detection, treatments, coping with cancer and recovery.

We have initiated a regional restocking program to ensure regular distribution of information and resources to 22 healthcare centres across regional South Australia. Our experienced cancer nurses have also provided education to regional and rural nurses to support their patients and carers with access to trustworthy cancer information and support services.



"Regional patients do not have access to the same services available in metro Adelaide and often have to travel significant distances to receive treatment. This puts an added complexity to their cancer journey and

is sometimes the reason patients elect not to get treated. Cancer Council SA plays an instrumental and pivotal role in a cancer patients' journey. Our new home for all South Australians impacted by cancer.

In November 2022, Cancer Council SA welcomed our first regional guests travelling to Adelaide for cancer treatment to our new home at 202 Greenhill Road, Greenhill Lodge. This building was only possible through our community's incredible generosity and support from the South Australian Government. It is the first of its kind in Australia, combining 120 rooms of supported accommodation, alongside cancer prevention, research and support programs.

Minister for Health and Wellbeing the Hon. Chris Picton MP, Cancer Council SA Board Chair the Hon. Karlene Maywald and Cancer Council SA Chief Executive Kerry Rowlands officially opened our new building with a ribbon cutting ceremony to mark this incredible milestone in early 2023. This beautiful celebration was also attended by many other Members of Parliament, Lodge guests, major donors, corporate partners, our volunteers, Board members and staff.

Since opening, we have received incredible feedback from our guests about our new Lodge, with guests reporting an average of 4.9 out of 5 overall satisfaction with their stay.

Drug and Alcohol Services South Australia
