This year's Tax Appeal will be here before we know it, and what a story it is promising to be.

South Australian family, the Shelmerdine's, will be sharing their story about how a cancer diagnosis for their 12-month-old daughter Poppy turned their lives upside down for three long, hard years.

Poppy's story is every parent's worst nightmare, but thanks to advances in research, Poppy and her family have been able to put the cancer diagnosis behind them and look to the future.

"Our entire world changed in that moment, and our lives were never the same again. It's been an emotional rollercoaster, particularly as a parent, watching your child go through so much pain." — Heath Shelmerdine, Poppy's Dad Poppy's story may have been a success, but with cancer being one of the most common causes of death among children aged under 15 years in Australia, there is more childhood cancer research required.

This Appeal aims to raise \$120,000 to fund vital cancer research funded through the Cancer Council Beat Cancer Project to support South Australians and their families impacted by leukaemia.

This year we met Craig Denning—a 48-year-old loving husband and father of three who was told that what he thought was a pulled muscle, was in fact terminal bowel cancer which would see him live only for another two to three years. Thanks to your generous past donations to Appeals, Cancer Council SA's support services were there for Craig and his family from the moment of diagnosis.

Craig shared his cancer story with our Appeal community in hopes to raise \$30,600 for Cancer Council SA's support services such as Cancer Council 13 11 20, our Outreach Nurses and our counselling services, so that other South Australian families impacted by cancer will have the same support that he and his family has had.

Craig and his family have relied on the information and support provided by Cancer Council 13 11 20, and now, thanks to your generous donations, more people like Craig and their families will be able to receive vital support when they need it most.

"For me, Cancer Council SA was there from the moment I found out about my diagnosis. Right after the doctors told me the news, I met the sweetest Cancer Council SA Outreach Nurse who came up to me and said the right thing—she understood. She knew. She had all the information and could answer all my questions, and that's when I first felt like there was support there. I had such great support from Cancer Council SA from that first day, there was no way I could ever feel alone."

The Beech Boys continue to bring it home!

For two weeks across October and November, four brothers—affectionately known as the Beech Boys—set off from the Gold Coast on their push bikes, cycling a massive 2,200km all the way to Adelaide to raise funds for Cancer Council SA in honour of their mum, Tammy-Lee Beech who passed away unexpectedly in 2016 from lung cancer.

The boys battled through falls and floods to raise a massive \$55,000 for early detection of cancer, which was announced at a gala event for 260 guests on the day they arrived in Adelaide. How amazing!

This was the second ride for the Beech Boys, the first being '220 For Tammy' in 2019 which was organised by youngest brother Kylan and dedicated to their mum.

The inaugural ride saw the brothers cycle 220kms from Adelaide to Barmera raising \$30,000, tripling their initial goal of \$10,000.

"My hope with '220 for Tammy' was that it would be a way for us all to remember and celebrate mum. And it was. It was also our way of doing something, so that other families won't experience growing up without their mum because of cancer." — Kylan Beech

"In 2007, my mum Denise was diagnosed with breast cancer, and I became her carer, travelling with her from Bordertown to Adelaide for treatment which included two surgeries: a partial mastectomy and a removal of her lymph nodes.

I found having a family or friend diagnosed with cancer to be a very isolating experience. There are so many emotions that are overwhelming during such a stressful time. And that's why I reached out to Cancer Council 13 11 20.

You're funding life-changing cancer research.

Discovering the next research breakthrough takes all of us, and, thanks to your visionary contributions we're able to help find them sooner by funding vital, life-saving research like that of Professor Michael Sorich.

Professor Sorich from Flinders University is the recipient of a three-year \$596,000 research grant through the Cancer Council Beat Cancer Project, which has only been made possible because of the generosity of people like you.

This cutting-edge research is working to develop online tools that will help cancer patients work through difficult decisions about how and when to use an anti-cancer medicine for the treatment of cancer.

Savoury muffin

Serves: 12

Preparation time: 15 minutes
Cook time: 20-25 minutes

Ingredients

- 1 cup self-raising flour, sifted
- 1 cup wholemeal self-raising flour, sifted, add husks back into flour mix
- 1 cup grated zucchini
- 1 cup grated carrot
- 1/3 cup red capsicum, finely chopped
- 1/3 cup corn kernels
- 1 cup grated tasty cheese
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- 125 g margarine, melted
- ½ cup reduced fat milk
- 2 tbsp sesame seeds
- 2 tbsp pepitas

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 190°C (170°C fan forced).
- 2. Combine both flours and cheese in a large bowl.
- 3. Place zucchini and carrot in a strainer, squeeze out excess liquid.



- 4. Add zucchini, carrot, capsicum and corn to flour and cheese mixture. Combine well.
- 5. In a small bowl combine eggs, margarine and milk. Pour into vegetable mixture and stir through until just combined.
- 6. Grease a 12-hole muffin tray with cooking oil spray or margarine, alternatively line the holes with muffin cases. Spoon the mixture evenly into the holes.
- 7. Sprinkle with sesame seeds and pepitas.
- 8. Bake for 20-25 minutes until cooked through. Remove muffins from tray and cool on a wire cooling rack.
